

We would like to apologise for the delay, though but, as we stated in the last issue, we will struggle to bring this literary masterpiece to you with quite the same regularity as before unless we receive more contributions, due to us having extra commitments here at FYI mansions this season. In terms of the league this season, things have gone from good to brilliant. Despite the results so far from 1994 at least we were top on 1st January. Whether we'll be top in May is anyone's guess. Malcolm has been having one of his best seasons for us and Chris Jones has been a revelation at the back. With new signings Henry, Wright and Simon Robinson looking full of promise there is a marked air of confidence in the future permeating FYI Mansions at the present time. It will probably all come crashing down around our ears in the next few weeks, and you can say we told you so, (or we'll have 350 points deducted for fielding two players with blonde hair by the Worcester FA and be demoted to the Huntingtree Under 11's League), but we may as well enjoy it while it's here.

How often do you leave after a good game of football only to hear comments such as "we used to score a lot more in the Banks's". True, we did score a lot more but let's see who we were playing against. During the 4 years which we won the Banks's 83-86 in our best 16 results - against teams like Ledbury, Armitage, GKN Sankey, Brereton etc. - we scored a total of 106 goals with 8 conceded. They may have been better results but can anyone say they were better games ??

IMPROVE YOUR SKILLS WITH

With the success of the Halesowen Town School of Excellence and it's mini soccer scheme the FYI editorial team decided to investigate. We despatched our top ace reporter Clark Staffordshire to find out more about the training methods that have made these schemes so successful as well as taken Halesowen to the top of the league at the beginning of the New Year.

Below are detailed some of the more unusual training techniques Halesowen coach Stuart Hall has used to achieve this success.

of the goal at the Old Hawne Lane end of the ground is liberally coated with Vaseline. Each player must then take it in turns to attempt to make his way from one end to the other. Difficult enough you might think. However, the remaining players then line up on the edge of the area and take shots to try and knock the player off the bar. This also is not as easy as it sounds as all players taking shots must be wearing size 78 Dr. Martens.

2) The players are then divided up into four teams, each of which elects a captain. This captain must then wear the costume shown on the right, and run from one end of the pitch to the other whilst negotiating a simple set of obstacles such as the opposing teams trying to knock them over by throwing wet sponges at them from the Harry Rudge Stand.

3) Following the discussion of tactics for the next match the most crucial part of the session takes place. For this part each of the four teams may play a joker entitling the winners of the fiveentides to the first showers before all the hot water goes.

This is by no means a typical

game of five-a-side, however. The bibs the players wear are not the normal style but consist of attached head pieces on a rather large scale. These headpieces completely obstruct any form of vision and so each team designates a non-playing coach. This coach is given a loudhailer with which to instruct his team on the direction to move, pass or shoot.

Some of these ideas may well be striking a few of you as unorthodox, to say the least. However, there can be no denying that they certainly get results.

Whilst they were briefly fashionable here during the 1970's, reports have reached us that they are still enjoying considerable popularity on the continent. Perhaps the next England manager should bear this in mind.

Ter-race Issue


Following on from last issue's announcement of the Kick Racism Out Of Football" campaign, an action for football clubs has now been drawn up. Listed plan are the points that the Comission for Racial below with backing from the FA, wish clubs to Equality, to:-

- Adopt a policy statement outlining the club's opposition to racism, and the actions it will take on supporters who shout indecent or racialist chanting (as outlined by the Football Offences Act 1991). This should be included in match programmes and displayed permanently in a prominent part of the ground.
- If racist chanting occurs at matches, make a public announcement condemning such behaviour.
- growing that a condition for season-ticket holders prohibits them from racist chanting, throwing missiles onto the pitch etc.
- 4) Take action to prevent the sale or distribution of racist literature in and around the grounds on match days.
- Take disciplinary action against any players who racially abuse players during matches.
- 6) Liase with supporters clubs to make the club's opposition to racism clear.
- Ensure that stewards and police have a strategy for working together to eject supporters (or to take appropriate action with those) who are contravening the Football Offences Act. If, in the case of individuals who are behaving in a racist or otherwise anti-social way, it would seem dangerous or inappropriate to take action against them during the

match, that those individuals be identified and barred from all further matches.

- Remove all racist graffiti from the grounds as a
- Adopt an equal oppurtunities policy in the areas of 9) employment and service provision.

Whilst some of the above points obviously have little relevance to a club of Halesowen's size some interesting aspects arise. Ferhaps the club ought to look into the possibility of involving itself in some, where and when this is possible. Food for thought

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South African ANC Political Prisoners Sports Equipment Appeal

Last May. 21 ANC political prisoners in Leeuwkop maximum security prison in Johannesburg went on hunger strike for 14 days to protest at the lack of progress in winning an amnesty for them. Because of the hunger strike, and subsequent campaign, some prisoners have now been given release dates. The Professional Footballers' Association made a donation to the campaign.

The "crimes" these prisoners were convicted for were either committed in the struggle to bring down apartheid, or in defence of their communities from armed attacks. We are now continuing the campaign for an amnesty for all of them.

The prison conditions they face are very harsh. However, they are allowed to receive gifts, including football equipment and videos. Football is the number one sport for black South Africans. We are therefore asking football supporters in Britain for donations to a fund to buy football and other sports equipment and videos for these prisoners.
